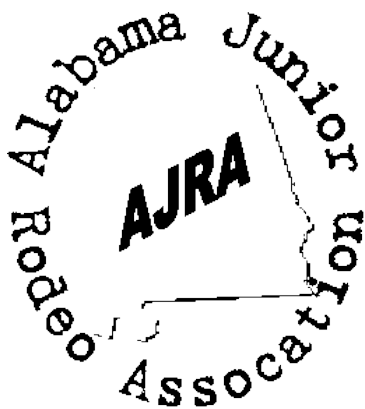

RULE BOOK

PURPOSES AND AIMS

To maintain order and standards similar to those followed by The Alabama High School Rodeo Association and the National High School Rodeo Association among member at their functions with a goal toward preparing younger student contestants for future participation in those organizations. This association is formed exclusively for charitable and educational purposes.

To promote Junior Rodeo on a Statewide scale and work toward this by bringing, Statewide recognition to this activity for students who are 14 and under at the first of the Alabama Junior Rodeo year (September 1) and are enrolled in grade 8 or lower or pursuing studies on that grade level or less.

To promote the highest type of conduct and sportsmanship at the various rodeos by setting up standards to be met to reach this end.

To keep the Western Heritage alive in America, and the State of Alabama.

To promote a close relationship among the people interested in this activity and the organization they represent.

To increase and maintain interest of the elementary and junior high school students in rodeos and other functions of the nation.

It is the intent of the Alabama Junior Rodeo Association to encourage any student to continue in school as a regularly enrolled student and to improve his/her education.

To follow all rules, the Constitution and By-Laws, as set down and duly adopted by the Association keeping in conformity as much as possible with the Constitution and By-Laws set out by the Alabama High School Rodeo Association and the National High School Rodeo Association.

There will be no discrimination due to race, sex or religion.

No part of the net earnings of the corporation shall insure to the benefit or be distributed to its members, trustees, officers or other person, except that the reasonable compensation for services rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of the purposes set forth in paragraphs 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9 hereof.

In the event of dissolution of this organization, any assets belonging to the Alabama Junior Rodeo Association after paying or making provisions for the payment of all liabilities of the corporation will go to the Alabama High School Rodeo Association.

MEMBERSHIP

The Alabama Junior Rodeo Association shall be incorporated as a not for profit corporation, shall abide by the laws of Alabama and Federal laws and regulations. The Alabama Junior Rodeo Association shall have Articles of Incorporation, Constitution and By-Laws consistent with the Alabama High\ School Rodeo Association and the National High School Rodeo Association's Constitution and By-Laws.

Any member, student or adult, who makes himself/herself incompatible to the operation of the program by words or deeds, may be suspended for a designated period of time, or impeached, after review of the situation by the Board of Directors, or by an

appointed Investigation Committee, and upon which action will be taken by a majority vote of the Board of Directors.

Membership shall be divided into three (3) major categories:

1. Student membership: elementary and junior high school students interested in the sport of rodeo and the affairs of the Alabama Junior Rodeo Association. Students paying State dues are eligible to contest at rodeos as long as they meet further requirements under these rules including but not limited to grade requirements.
2. Adult membership: consists of parents /guardians of student members.
3. Supportive membership: any person or organization wishing to support the Alabama Junior Rodeo Association by donations.

All members will be required to live in the State of Alabama. Exceptions to this rule may be granted by the Board of Directors to contestants seeking hardship relief in writing on a form provided by the AJRA State Secretary.

DUES

Dues vary according to type of membership and are subject to changes as they occur by action of the Board of Directors. All dues are payable to the State Secretary by September 1, annually, or at the time of joining as a new member. Local entrants may participate in only one rodeo without joining the Association.

OFFICERS

There shall be adult officers in the

Alabama Junior Rodeo Association. The officers of the Association shall be a President, Vice President, 2nd Vice President, Secretary/Treasurer and a Board of Directors composed of an adult director for each event that is presently being offered for competition by the Alabama Junior Rodeo Association. All officers and board members serve a one year term with election being held annually at the Annual Meeting held at the State Finals Rodeo. ELECTION AND VOTING OF OFFICERS AND DIRECTORS: All nominations for the position of Officers and Directors will be voted by a secret ballot systems beginning June 2003 at the annual AJRA Membership Meeting. This secret ballot system will preserve the integrity of the process and make the nominees as well as the membership feel more comfortable about their votes. The AJRA Secretary will prepare the ballots for the election.

Applications for Director and Officers positions will open April 1st and close May 1st of each year thereafter. The AJRA State Secretary will notify each member on or about April 15th the name(s) that have submitted applications. The Nominating Committee will interview each applicant after May 1st. If anyone is interested they must submit an application to the AJRA State Secretary by the deadline. We will not take nominations from the floor at our Mandatory meeting which will be held at the Finals. Alabama Junior Rodeo Officers and Board of Directors term of office will begin on July 1st of each year thereafter.

STATE FINALS

The Alabama Junior Rodeo Association shall conduct a State Championship Junior Rodeo which will qualify contestants in the first five places in each event for State Awards. The finals shall be a two go-around rodeo with a short go determined by points made in the first go, second go and points brought in from the regular seasons rodeos. At least the top ten shall qualify for the final go and there shall be no role up from any points places below the tenth hole. This format may be changed by a majority vote of the Board of Directors, with discussion offered for the general membership.

ALABAMA JUNIOR RODEO ASSOCIATION, INC. RODEO GUIDELINES

The following are guidelines for Alabama Junior Rodeo Association sanctioned rodeos, payoff requirements and special event rules:

1. All matters relating to the operation of the Alabama Junior Rodeo Association and rodeos sanctioned thereby shall be approved and contested according to rules set out in the National High School Rodeo Association Rules, Constitution and By-laws, (hereinafter referred to as High School Rule Book) to the extent that same would apply to situations pertaining to the Alabama Junior Rodeo Association. AJRA contestants consist of students, kindergarten through 8th grade who are age 14 and under on the first day of September of the year in which that contestant joins the Association. It will be

incumbent on the applicant's parents /guardians to seek an exception to this rule if a child age/grade problem results from a learning disability or a medical or psychological problem. In order to gain an exception to this rule the applicant's parents will need to provide the Association official documentation which confirms the problem sufficient to satisfy the Board of the AJRA (by majority) that the age/grade problem did not result from lack of effort or attendance. The Board will be afforded some discretion in this matter after reviewing documentation and the totality of the circumstances. A parents'/guardians' opinion that a disability exists will be insufficient to satisfy that Board that an exception to this rule is warranted. These students will still be required to meet the grade requirements set forth for all Junior Rodeo Members.

2. Membership fees shall be \$40.00 for the first student member in each family and \$25.00 for each additional member per family. Entry fees shall be \$20.00 per event except Boy's Jr. Bull Riding will be \$35.00 (amended, August, 2003); \$20.00 entry fees will be divided as follows: Jack-pot fees \$7.00; stock charge \$8.00 and AJRA Fees \$5.00. Boy's Jr. Bull Riding fees will be divided as follows: Jack-pot fees \$15.00; stock charge \$15.00 and AJRA fees \$5.00 (amended, August, 2007). Entry fees shall be paid in cash, small bills, no checks. Fees may be subject to change.
3. All contestants must submit to the Secretary a "Minor's Release Form" signed, notarized

and sealed. No member will be allowed to rodeo without this form.

4. A student who is in the 8th grade or under and who is 14 years of age or younger may ride as a local one time before joining the AJRA. A student participating as a local must call in to the call-in secretary on the regular call-in night so that stock can be ordered for his/her event and must pay entry fees at the rodeo. Local entrants must have a signed, notarized and sealed "Minor's Release Form". Local riders will be placed at the bottom of the event. Non-member local riders will be eligible for jackpot money, but not end of year points. Entry fees will be \$20.00 except for the Boy's Jr. Bull Riding which will be \$35.00. Each contestant will be required to pay a \$10.00 office fee per contestant for the participating rodeo.
5. Events are as follows: Boy's Events: Boy's Breakaway Roping, Boy's Calf Roping, Boy's Chute Dogging, Boy's Jr. Bull Riding; Girl's Events: Girl's Barrel Racing, Girl's Pole Bending, Girl's Breakaway Roping, Girl's Goat Tying. Team Roping is a Co-ed event. Teams may consist of two boys, two girls, or a boy and a girl. Ribbon Roping will consist of a boy and girl team. A Queen Contest will be held at the State Finals.
6. Jackpot payoff is as follows:
 - 1-5 Contestants - 1 place = 100%
 - 6-10 Contestants - 2 places = 60%/40%
 - 11-15 Contestants - 3 places = 50%/30%/20%
 - 16-20 Contestants - 4 places = 40%/30%/20%/10%
 - 21-25 Contestants - 5 places =

35%/30%/20%/10%/5% I

f there is no qualified time or ride, ground money will be paid. In the event of Jr. Bull Riding: Any contestant that turns stock out or does not attempt to ride- WILL NOT BE ELIGIBLE for any "ground money".

Approved, June 2005.

7. The National High School Rodeo Association points system will be used for regular season rodeos:

10 points – 1st place

8 points - 3rd place

6 points – 5th place

4 points - 7th place

2 points - 9th place

8. Stock charges, late charges and award fees must be paid if a member enters a rodeo and fails to compete. No further entries will be accepted from said member until all such fees are paid. In the event a contestant cannot attend a

rodeo and notifies the call-in secretary by 8:00 p.m., on Thursday following call-in for the Rodeo, they will not be fined.

9. Call-in will be taken from 6 p.m. until 8 p.m. on the specified call-in date. Members entering late will be allowed one warning and afterwards will be assessed a \$10 late fee to be paid at the time the contestant pays his/her entry fees. No entries will be taken after Thursday night following the call-in date unless approved by the President of the AJRA (amended, August, 1998). You must be on the program to rodeo and to be on the program you must call in. Secretaries will begin taking entry fees one hour prior to the

Grand Entry. Secretaries will stop taking entry fees 15 minutes prior to the Grand entry unless approved by the President of the AJRA. You have 45 minutes prior to the Grand Entry to pay your entry fees at each rodeo. (August, 1998) In the event same fees are paid late, on the first occasion there will be warning. On the second and subsequent occasions, a \$10 fine will be assessed and must be paid with the entry fees in order to compete at the rodeo. No entry fees will be accepted before the date of the rodeo. FINES WILL BE ENFORCED.

10. Each family/member is responsible for their own hospital insurance. Rodeo insurance is 24 hour liability coverage for spectators, rodeo producers, etc. This does not cover contestants. The AJRA is not liable for injuries. That is why you must submit the release form.
11. All committees desiring approval of a junior rodeo must request an approval form from an officer or director. Upon receipt of same, the President within a reasonable period of time, will either approve or not approve said rodeo. A form approved by the Board of Directors shall be used for this purpose and shall not be accepted unless same is completed in full at the time it is submitted.

12. One back number is provided each contestant. Numbers must be worn as a part of the required attire at each rodeo. Steer riders will be allowed to leave their numbers on their shirts while competing rather than placing their back numbers on their vests. If a contestant loses his her number, a temporary

number will be allowed for one day only. One replacement number will be provided each contestant and any additional numbers will be provided at a reasonable charge to the contestant.

13. It is the contestant's responsibility to immediately turn in grades at the end of a grading period. Grades are to be faxed or mailed in a timely manner to the State Secretary. Grades are to be submitted to the State Secretary at the beginning of the year between semesters (December - January), prior to check in at State Finals. If a contestant becomes ineligible due to grades after first semester, that contestant may be reinstated providing after the next grading period (6 or 9 weeks) he/she becomes academically eligible to rodeo. Contestants must pass minimum of 4 subjects. (Amended June 2007)

14. Paying your membership fees and submitting necessary forms for the first time and entering one rodeo constitutes a contestant's Rookie Year unless circumstances such as an injury or illness occurs prior to the first rodeo and the excuse is approved by the Board of Directors.

15. An Event Champion shall be named in each event based on total points earned during the regular season and at the State Finals. An All-Around Boy and All-Around Girl Champion shall also be named as defined by the High School Rule Book. An All-Around Rookie Boy and All-Around Rookie Girl Champion shall also be named. Rookie champion requirements shall be the

same as for All Around with the additional requirements that the contestant be a first year member of the AJRA and must have competed in two or more events in at least one half of the rodeos held since the date said contestant joined. In the event of a tie in either the All Around or the All Around Rookie, the student member winning points in the most events will be declared the champion. A "Miss Alabama Junior Rodeo" shall be crowned. She shall have one alternate. An award will be issued as All Around Junior for 5th grade and under- Boy and All Around Junior for 5th grand and under – Girl.

16. To be eligible to compete in the State Finals in an event, contestant must have competed in that event in at least one-half ^(1/2) of the regular season rodeos held since the date contestant joined. You must be a member by December 31st of that rodeo year.

17. Student members are required to sell program ads in order to be eligible to compete in the REGULAR AJRA RODEOS AND STATE FINALS. Minimum ad sales \$250.00 SUBJECT TO CHANGE. Each AJRA Contestant is responsible for having their ad quota by the deadlines. (Amended June, 2006) The minimum ad sales for the first child in each family is \$250 (amended August, 1999), second child is \$100, third child is \$50, and fourth or more \$25. All ads and ad money must be turned into the secretary at designated time. ADS FOR THE STATE FINALS PROGRAM BOOK WILL BE DUE AS FOLLOWS: One-half (1/2) due

by February 1, and balance due by April 1.
NO AD MONEY BY FEBRUARY 1 - NO
RODEO - NO BALANCE OF AD MONEY
BY APRIL 1- NO RODEO.

18. Any contestant that receives a disciplinary from School or Court that is associated with alcohol or drugs will forfeit membership with the Alabama Junior Rodeo Association for the remainder of the Rodeo season.

19. Draw Partner Option A team Roper or Ribbon Roper can only enter once at any rodeo with partner of his/her choice however, a TR or RR contestant with no partner may request a partner be supplied as a drawn partner from a volunteer list of entered contestants in that event. This option is only available three times in one season. Thereafter, the contestant must enter with a partner. No points will be awarded to the drawn partner, however the drawn partner has the option of paying additional entry fee for that event to be eligible for day money. Volunteer List will be on hand with the Call-in secretary. Volunteer partners may only be drawn once per event, per rodeo. Draw partners are available on a first - come first-serve basis. Request for draw partner must be made at time of call-in for each rodeo. No Draw partners will be allowed at State Finals Rodeos.

20. Substitute Partner Option This rule is designed to be used only in one or two instances:

If Contestant's Team Roping or Ribbon Roping partner called in and stock ordered

for his/her team, and partner does not show up, then before the rodeo starts, upon approval of event director, a substitute partner may be drawn from a list of willing contestants in said event. Points will not be awarded to substitute partner, however day money will be available if entry fees have been paid for the original team.

If contestant's Team Roping or Ribbon Roping partner is called in and stock is drawn for his/her team, and partner is injured, sick, or unable to compete due to medical reasons suffered during the day's rodeo, then before that event starts, upon approval of event director, a substitute partner may be drawn from a list of willing contestants in said event. Points will not be awarded to a substitute partner, however day money will be available if entry fees have been paid for the original team. This rule does not apply to injury to a contestants horse.

EVENT RULES:

All events with the exception of Chute Dogging will follow the NHSRA Rule Book. The only exceptions to event rule in the NHSRA rule book are as follows: A thirty (30) second time limit shall apply in all timed events unless noted a different time.

1. **BOYS AND GIRLS BREAKAWAY ROPING:** A thirty (30) second time/two loops shall apply in this event (amended September, 2001).

2. **TIE DOWN CALF ROPING:** Tie down calf roping (added June, 1993) follow the High School Rule Book except for weight

limit which will be between 160 and 200 pounds (amended August, 1999). A sixty (60) second time limit will apply in this event.

3. **TEAM ROPING:** A sixty (60) second time limit shall apply in this event.

4. **GIRLS' BARREL RACING:** A sixty (60) second time limit shall apply in this event, or if you break the pattern you must leave the arena - no re-ride.

5. **POLE BENDING:** A sixty (60) second time limit shall apply in this event, or if you break the pattern you must leave the arena - no re-ride.

6. **GOAT TYING:** A sixty (60) second time limit shall apply in this event. (Effective, 2002). Follow High School Rule Book except for weight limit, which shall be 30-50 lbs. (Amended, July 2005). **PLEASE NOTE:** If the arena is too short the alleyway may be declared part of the arena. If so, this will be announced prior to the event, otherwise the alleyway is not part of the arena.

7. **JUNIOR BULL RIDING:** Will be timed for 6 seconds. All Jr. Bull riding Contestants must wear helmets, vests and protective mouthpiece. Stock used for bull riding will be uniform in size, weighing no more than 1000 pounds and no less than 600 pounds. A dressed-out bullfighter will be present at the beginning of the rodeo until the end of the rodeo. Any Contestant that turns stock Out or does not attempt to ride-WILL NOT BE ELIGIBLE for any "ground money". Approved, June 2005.

8. **RIBBON ROPING:** A thirty (30)

second time limit shall apply in this event with one (1) loop. Calves shall weigh between 180-250#. Follow High School Rule Book - see Wrangler Rules. This event shall be a girl and boy team. This event was added to AJRA, July 23, 2005.

9. CHUTE DOGGING: A thirty (30) second time limit shall apply in this event. Chute Dogging is not a High School event and has no guidelines in the NHSRA Rule Book. AJRA general rules will follow the Alabama Junior High School Rodeo Association Rules. With steers loaded in bucking chute, dogger gets beside the steer, right hand in front of or behind the right front shoulder. When dogger calls for the steers the chute gate will open, Dogger must keep right hand in front of or behind shoulder until the steer's nose crosses the score line. If dogger moves into throwing position or touches either horn before steer's nose crosses score line there will be a ten (10) second penalty added to the time. If steer is thrown before crossing the score line the dogger will be disqualified. After crossing the start line, dogger must bring it to a stop or change its direction and twist it down. Chute Dogger must allow steer to maintain forward motion to the score line. Chute Dogger may not choke steer.

Event Rules:

1. Steer will be loaded in bucking chute.
2. Cattle will be drawn.
3. Cattle may be run randomly.
4. Cattle weight must not exceed 400 pounds.
5. Contestant will be allowed to have a taller in

the box. If the tailer steps out of the box a no time will be given. Barrier judge will flag tailer.

6. Contestant will call for steer.
7. Time starts when steer's nose crosses the 6 ft. line. Barrier judge will hag start time.
8. Contestant may throw steer when steer's nose crosses the 12 ft. line. Field judge will flag the throw. Steer is considered thrown only when lying on it's side or back with all four feet and head in the same direction.
9. If the steer is accidentally knocked down or thrown down before it crosses the line it must be let up to all four feet and then thrown.
10. If you have any questions contact your event director.

QUEEN RULES:

Miss AJRA must pay application fees, jack-pot fees at each rodeo, ad amount quota and State Finals fees.

AJRA Queen and Flag carriers will carry the American Flags and State Flags correctly. The music chosen by the AJRA Queen will be appropriate.

AJRA Queen cannot miss more than two (2) rodeos - in such case, the Board of Directors will meet with the AJRA Queen and family to discuss necessary actions. If AJRA Queen misses a Rodeo, she is responsible for paying her jack-pot fees. If the 1st runner up has to fill in for the AJRA Queen, the fees will be the same as the AJRA

Queen fees - must pay jack-pot only.

No contestant may compete for or serve as AJRA Queen after having reigned as AJRA Queen. In the event that an AJRA Queen was unable to fulfill her term for an entire season, due to reasons beyond her control, (i.e. sickness or injury) she may petition the board for an exception to this rule. The decision of the board will be binding.

Miss Alabama Junior Rodeo shall carry the American Flag during the opening ceremonies and all grand entries at all junior rodeos. She shall be responsible for hauling the flags for the association and her stock/office charges and the association shall pay award fees. Miss Alabama Junior Rodeo shall also be responsible for organizing grand entry, providing music and obtaining flag carriers at each rodeo and the state finals. STATE FINALS QUEEN CONTESTANT RULES WILL **BE PROVIDED** TO ALL INTERESTED MEMBERS PRIOR TO THE DEADLINE FOR THE QUEEN CONTEST APPLICATIONS. These rules then become an integral part of the event rules.

REMINDERS:

1. **Read and study the high school rule book, see AJRA Rule Book for Queen Contest rules.**
2. **Read and study the AJIRA rule book, see AJRA rule Book for Queen Contest rules.**
3. **The decision of the judge, flagman, or timers will be final. No protest by a contestant will be permitted except through the event director. Such protest**

must be made before the end of the performance in which the question arises. A parent cannot protest an event. Know the event directors

4. The Arena Director is to assure that the rodeo is conducted in accordance with the AJRA and where applicable the NHRSA Rule Book(s) to the best interest of the contestant. The Arena Director shall use his/her discretion in addressing circumstances or actions that do not comply with rules set forth in the AJRA and/or NHRSA Rule Book(s). Such issues will be addressed by an appeal by the Arena Director to the Judge for an immediate ruling, and/or a delayed ruling to be made by AJRA Board of Directors at a meeting immediately following the performance.
5. No contestant may talk to a judge or timer while an event is going on. Please go to your event director.
6. Failure to understand the rules will not be accepted as an excuse. Read the rule book.
7. You must follow rules regarding proper attire: Contestants, parents, and assistants must wear western attire while in the rodeo arena, chute areas, stock pens or stock working areas and at check-in. Full western attire and back numbers are required for contestants from check in until the rodeo is completed. (Rules regarding Western Attire amended August, 2008.) **CONTESTANTS MUST HAVE BACK NUMBERS ON BEFORE CHECK-IN UNTIL THE END OF THE RODEO.**
8. Western Attire - long sleeve, button up

western style shirt with collar and cuffs (no sweatshirts, t-shirts, or pullover sweaters allowed); western boots (sport lacers or sneaker type shoes are not acceptable); western trousers or jeans; cowboy hats (helmets may be worn in lieu of western hats while in competition). Western wear is also required at check in. You may change out of your Western attire after the last contestant of the last event of the rodeo is through competing. No tank tops or strapless tops.

9. Parents are allowed to participate in his/her child's event For example: a parent can run the timer, tail the steer or turn out the cattle.
10. No person shall be allowed in the arena during a rodeo performance unless entered in an event or as an assistant and dressed in full western attire. This rule will be enforced by the Arena Director and Rodeo Officials.
11. All contestants must leave the arena immediately after competing.
12. HAT RULE: Contestants are not allowed to intentionally take hat off after starting a run. Hat must be on top of head when you enter the arena.
13. The tractor driver will drag the Arena before the Barrel Racing, Pole Bending, Goat Tying events begin.
14. All contestant helpers must leave the area immediately after assisting.
15. Contestants are not allowed to enter the arena and exercise or warm-up horses after the rodeo begins. Example: Ropers should not lope a circle before entering the box.
16. Grand ENTRY: AJRA Contestants can not pass the Queen in the grand entry. Grand

Entry will be kept at a slow pace. Grand Entry will begin 15 minutes before the regular rodeo begins. If a High School Rodeo follows then the AJRA Queen will post Flags only with no Grand Entry. Grand Entry is optional - contestant may or may not ride.

17. For Score Line Diagrams, Barrel Racing and Pole Bending, see the back of the rule book.
18. No performance or slack can be held at any Junior Rodeo unless a fully equipped ambulance and trained personnel are present at the rodeo arena.
19. Effective October 1, 2000, AJRA will abide by AHSRA Rule stating that Judges and Flagmen shall not officiate a rodeo in which a member of their immediate family is competing.

GENERAL STATE FINALS RULES

To be eligible for participation in the state finals the student must:

- A. Be a member in good standing of the AJRA
- B. Must submit state finals applications and fees to secretary by deadline.
- C. Must comply with requirements relating to grades.
- D. Must have sold his/her quota of ads.
- E. Must have competed in each event being entered at the state finals in at least one half of rodeos held since the date contestant joined.

AJRA Standing Rules (effective August, 2003)

1. All Points and Standings will be posted at the next Rodeo.
2. Each contestant is required to complete a mandatory call-in form and return it to the

State Secretary before the call-in date for the second rodeo. Starting with the second rodeo of each season contestants must call the call-in secretary only to draw out of events or rodeos.

AJRA Ground Rules (Effective August, 2003)

3. The AJRA Board of Directors will use their discretion in removing unsafe horses and canceling events and/or performances where arena conditions are considered to be unsafe.
4. NO Stud Horses will be allowed.
5. Contestants will be given three (3) calls to get their horse in the arena. If they cannot - they will be a "no-show". 1st call - 60 seconds, 2nd call - 60 seconds and 3rd call - 60 seconds, then no show.
6. No fresh or green livestock will be used at any AJRA Rodeo. (effective, July, 2005)
7. Livestock will be tied three (3) times at the discretion of the President, Vice President and Event Director. (effective, July, 2005)
8. Barrel Racers and Pole Bending Contestants may be assisted to the plane of the Arena Gate (helper cannot cross the plane of the Arena Gate), contestant could be disqualified. All Contestant helpers must leave the arena immediately after assisting. (effective, July, 2005)
9. Each AJRA Contestant and locals will pay a \$10.00 office fee per rodeo beginning with the 2007-2008 Rodeo Season. (effective, June 2007)
10. AJRA Officers and Directors recommend that contestants use slick sole boots for goat tying and calf roping events to prevent

contestants from getting hung up - safety reasons. (effective June, 2006)

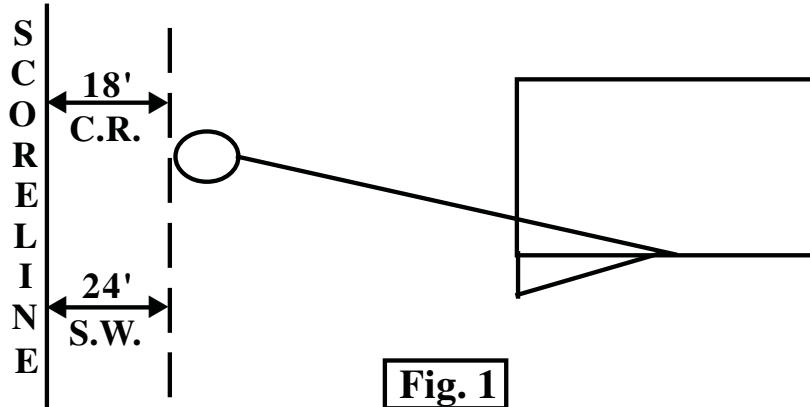

SCORE LENGTHS: Length of the score line to be determined according to the livestock, the length of the arena, and the arena conditions. All score lengths are subject to Directors' or representatives' approval.

CR, BK: Minimum length of score will be the length of the roping box minus four (4) feet. Maximum length of score will be eighteen (18) feet.

SW: The score may be no longer than the length of the steer wrestling box minus six (6) feet, unless the box is less than fourteen (14) feet. In that instance the length of the score would be a maximum of the length of the box minus five (5) feet.

TR: The minimum length of the team roping score line shall be the length of the box minus two (2) feet.

GT: Stakes are to be 15 feet from center line left and right and 100 feet from the timer.

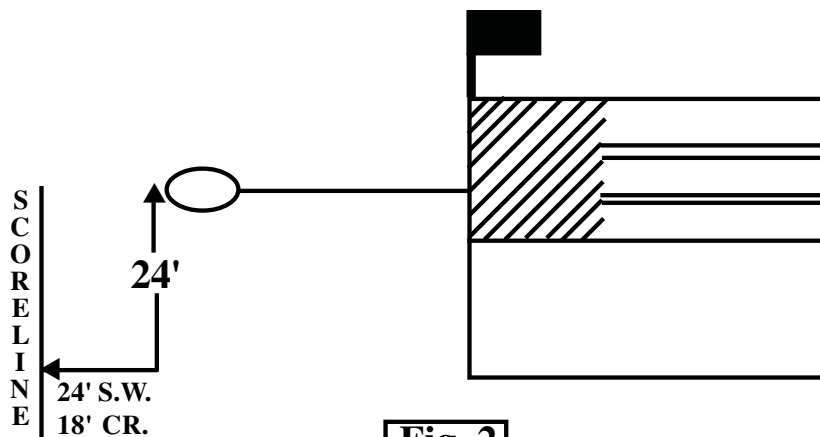
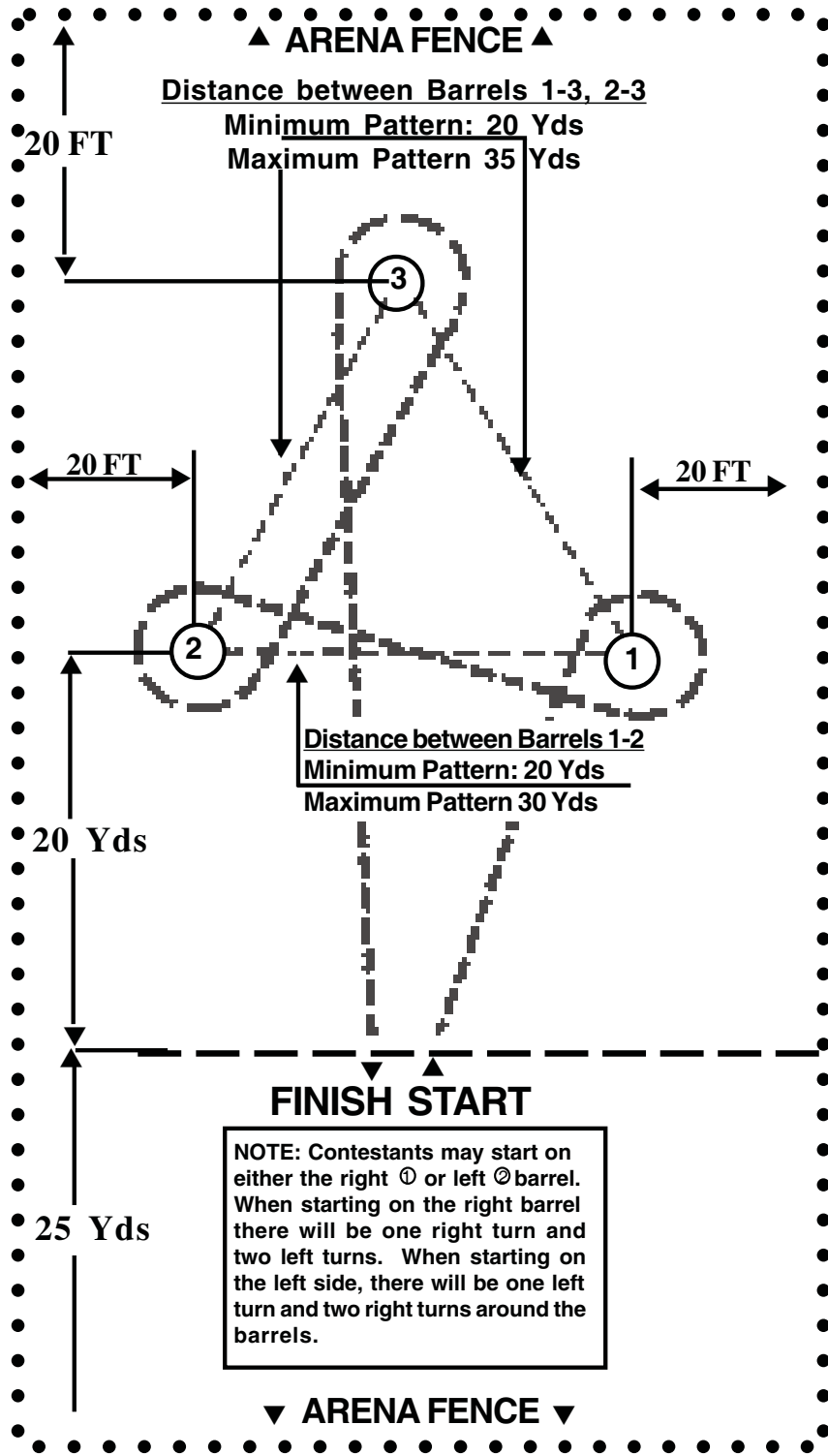
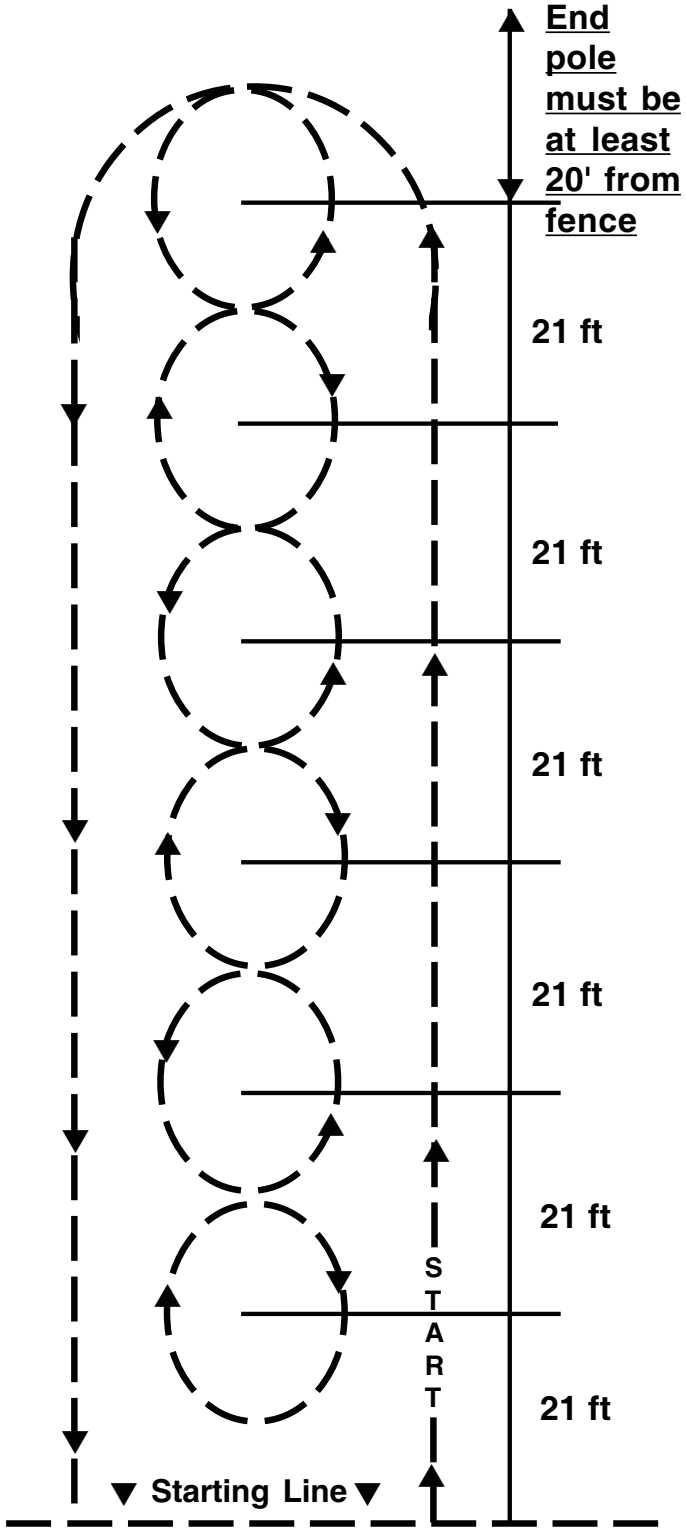
